PUT IN THREE COFFINS

Temporary Interment of the Body of Late Pope Leo.

WAS HELD SATURDAY

The Remains Will Remain in Niche One Year, Final Interment to Be in the Church of St. John Laterane.

Rome, July 27.—The body of Pope Leo XIII. was interred Saturday night in its temporary resting place in the niche over the door to the left of the Chapel of the Sacrament. The ceremony began at 7 o'clock. The Vatican prelates conducting the services. It was first intended to send out only 700 invitations, but at the last moment they were increased to 1000.

The body was raised on a bier and carried upon the shoulders of the men who had so often borne the pontiff during his lifetime, and was carried into the chapel of St. Peter's, the remains not being placed in the coffin until the chapel was reached.

The procession was led by the monks of St. Peter's, all chanting the Miserere, and passed before the chapel of St. Peter's, finally ending at the choir chapel. There the chant was changed to "In Paradisum." A few drops of holy water were sprinkled over the coffin and the last absolution was pronounced.

In the coffin was placed the pontifical ornaments, including all the medals the pope had received during his reign, and a scroll telling of the principal acts of Leo's pontificate were laid at his feet. The face and hands were then reverently covered with a thin white veil, the coffin was placed in another of lead, and that in turn was placed in one of elm wood, covered with scarlet brocade. Both were hermetically sealed and raised to the niche over the door during the recitation of this final benediction.

The body will remain in this niche for one year, when it will be transferred to its final resting place in the church of St. John Laterane.

READ THE WILL.

As Before Stated, It Is Bequeathed to the Three Nephews.

Rome, July 27.—Several thousand of the faithful crowded St. Peter's Sunday to pay tribute to the sarcophagus containing the remains of the late pope, on which is the following simple inscription in gilded letters: "Leo XIII. Pont. Max."

Meanwhile requiem masses continued in the Chapel of the Sacrament as well as many other Roman churches. The will of Leo was read. While nominally

leaving the estate of Carpine to his nephew, Ludovic Pecci, it really makes no change, as the whole family property, amounting approximately to \$100,000, had already been divided among the three nephews, Count Camillo having already sold his share.

The congregation again made further progress with the arrangements for the conclave. Cardinal Gibbons arrived, but did not attend the meeting. A wall is being built around the apartments where the conclave will be held. It is already ten feet high.

Some of the Italian bookmakers here propose to conduct public betting on the chances of the papal candidates, and in order to obtain permission to do so offered to donate their gains to charitable institutions. The government, however, promptly refused the request.

MOST SHOCKING.

Thirty-Three Girls Burn in a Barn That Was Set on Fire.

Vienna, July 27.—De Zell reports one of the most shocking catastrophes ever known in these parts. According to the paper, a number of laborers attacked a number of young women employed on the same farm and the latter had to be called upon. He locked the girls, thirty-three in number, in the barn in order to protect them from the men. This, however, only seemed to enrage the laborers and they set fire to the barn and all of the girls perished in the flames.

Death of a Congressman.

Philadelphia, July 27.—Congressman Robert H. Forrester of the Fourth district died at his home in Torrensale Sunday. He had been ill for some time. He was a large manufacturer of leather and was president of the Leather Manufacturers Association of Philadelphia.
